Problem 3: A function is defined by the set of ordered pairs: $\{(1,5), (2,10), (3,7), (4,10)\}$. State the domain and range.

Solution: Domain is the set of x-values: $\{1, 2, 3, 4\}$. Range is the set of y-values: $\{5, 10, 7\}$. Note that 10 appears twice but is listed only once in the set. Answer key should show set notation.

These straightforward examples build the foundation for more complex worksheets that include rational functions, piecewise definitions, and absolute values.
