 6. **Final Details:** Deepen the darkest shadows (pupils, nostril openings, deep under the ear). Add whiskers with swift, confident strokes using a sharp, hard pencil. Soften any harsh lines with your blending stump. Step back and assess the overall balance of light and dark.
