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INTRODUCTION

For decades, the United States Medical Licensing Examination Step 2 Clinical Skills (USMLE Step 2 CS) was one of the most challenging and anxiety-provoking hurdles for international and American medical graduates alike. It tested not just medical knowledge, but the ability to communicate effectively, take a focused history, perform a targeted physical exam, and write a succinct patient note—all under strict time constraints. Pass/fail decisions were based on performance across all encounters. Because the exam was both expensive and logistically demanding, students invested heavily in preparation. Many students, especially those who had not trained in the United States, struggled with the format: history of present illness, past medical history, physical exam findings, differential diagnosis, and diagnostic plan. Kaplan dedicated entire sessions to note structure, common pitfalls, and time management. Students learned to list a differential diagnosis in order of likelihood and to justify each possibility with evidence from the encounter. They also practiced writing “pertinent positives and negatives” concisely—a skill that directly translates to real-world medical documentation.

Kaplan's CIS training was particularly thorough. Instructors emphasized that the patient should always feel heard. Techniques such as reflective listening, summarizing what the patient said, and asking if there is anything else the patient wants to discuss were drilled repeatedly. Students also practiced dealing with difficult scenarios: angry patients, tearful patients, or those who refused certain aspects of the exam. Kaplan's workshops taught candidates to remain calm, professional, and empathetic, which often made the difference between a pass and a fail on the CIS subcomponent.
