Informati ve / Neutral Tone

Prioritizes clarity and objectivity. Avoids emotional language and personal opinion. Common in news reporting and academic summaries. Example: “The study involved 500 participants who were monitored over a six-month period.” This tone conveys reliability.

Humorou s / Witty Tone

Effective for branding, entertainment, and certain social media contexts. Requires careful use to avoid offense. Example: “We take our coffee as seriously as we take our deadlines — very.” Can make a brand memorable but must fit the audience.
