STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE TO USING A PAPER ROLLER COASTER TEMPLATE

Step 2: Cut Out the Pieces

Carefully cut along the solid lines of each piece. Use scissors for large, straight sections and a craft knife for small, intricate details. Take your time. Clean cuts lead to cleaner folds and a more stable structure. If the template includes fold lines, lightly score them with a ruler and a bone folder or the back of a butter knife. Scoring creates a crisp, straight fold.

Step 3: Fold and Assemble the Track Sections

Fold along the scored lines to create the track rails and base. Most paper roller coaster templates use a "U-shaped" or "L-shaped" track design that guides the marble. Assemble the track sections by connecting them with tape. Be precise with your alignment to prevent gaps or bumps that could

derail the marble.

Step 4: Build the Supports

Supports are critical for maintaining the height and slope of your coaster. Fold and assemble each support according to the template instructions. Place the supports at the designated positions and secure them to the track. A stable base is essential for a coaster that performs well. If your coaster wobbles, add additional tape or reinforce the supports with extra cardstock.
