Work through each line slowly. Use phonetic guides online or apps like Forvo to hear individual words. A great exercise is to repeat each line after a native speaker, mirroring their intonation.

Step 3: Learn the Lyrics in Small Chunks

Do not try to memorise the entire anthem at once. Break it down:

1. Learn the first line: “Mae hen wlad fy nhadau yn annwyl i mi.”
2. Add the second line: “Gwlad beirdd a chantorion, enwogion o fri.”
3. Combine them until you can say the verse without hesitation.
4. Then learn the chorus: “Gwlad, gwlad, pleidiol wyf i’m gwlad...”
5. Finally, put verse and chorus together.
