From below the sink, slide the rubber gasket and then the mounting ring (often called the snap ring or backup ring) over the flange. Tighten the mounting ring screws evenly to secure the assembly. Wipe away any excess putty from the sink surface before it hardens.

Step 4: Assemble the Disposal Unit

Follow the manufacturer's instructions to attach the mounting bracket to the top of the disposal unit. This bracket usually slides into a groove on the mounting ring and is secured with a screw or clip. If your disposal has a removable splash guard (baffle), install it now. This step is critical because a loose splash guard can cause water to leak back up into the sink.

Step 5: Connect the Drain Pipes

Slide the discharge tube (the pipe that carries ground food and water out of the disposal) into the unit and tighten the collar. Connect the discharge tube to the P-trap using slip nuts and washers. You may need to cut the discharge tube to the correct length with a hacksaw. If you are connecting a dishwasher, remove the knockout plug inside the disposal's dishwasher inlet port using a screwdriver and hammer. Attach the dishwasher hose to this port with a hose clamp. Double-check all connections for tightness, but avoid overtightening plastic nuts.

Step 6: Wire the Garbage Disposal

Garbage disposals typically have two electrical connection methods: direct wiring or using a power cord. For most DIY installations, a power cord is simpler. Remove the electrical cover plate on the disposal. Connect the black wire to the black (hot) wire, the white wire to the white (neutral) wire, and the green or bare wire to the green ground screw on the disposal. Use wire nuts and wrap them with electrical tape for safety. Reinstall the cover plate securely. If you are unsure about electrical work, hire a professional electrician to complete this step.

Step 7: Test for Leaks and Final Assembly

Turn the water supply back on and check for any drips around the sink flange, P-trap connections, and hose attachments. Tighten any loose connections. Plug in the disposal (or turn on the breaker) and run a small amount of water before flipping the switch. Listen for unusual vibrations or rattling. If everything sounds smooth and no leaks appear, your installation is successful.

PRO TIPS FOR A SMOOTH INSTALLATION

First, always use plumber's putty on the sink flange, but use silicone caulk on metal-to-metal connections to prevent corrosion.
