Question 5: Name something that happened in the Garden of Eden.

- 1. **Adam and Eve ate the fruit** (the Fall)
- 2. The serpent tempted Eve
- 3. God walked in the garden
- 4. Adam named the animals
- 5. They were expelled

When designing your own survey, collect at least 50–100 responses for a good spread. The more responses, the more accurate the ranking. You can use online survey tools, paper ballots at church, or even quick polls on social media.

HOW TO CREATE YOUR OWN FAMILY FEUD BIBLE GAME

Step 1: Choose Your Audience

Are you playing with children, teens, adults, or a mixed group? This determines the difficulty of your questions. For a youth group, you might focus on well-known stories.
