BUILDING A STRONG FOUNDATION IN READING WITH SHORT E WORKSHEETS FOR FIRST GRADE

Use Worksheets as a Springboard

Once a child has completed a worksheet, encourage them to use the words in their own sentences. If the worksheet featured words like *net*, *jet*, and *wet*, ask the child to write a short story about a jet that gets wet. This takes the learning from recognition and recall to application and creativity. It also helps children see the purpose of learning these words—they can use them to express their own ideas. This is a powerful motivator for young writers.

Provide Consistent, Spaced Practice

Spaced repetition is key to long-term retention. Instead of doing five short E worksheets in one day, spread them out over a week. Do one worksheet on Monday, a different type on Wednesday, and a review worksheet on Friday. This spacing helps solidify the learning and prevents cognitive overload.
