When the candy hits the soda, thousands of bubbles instantly form on its surface. Because the candy is dense, it sinks, and the bubbles form all over its surface as it descends. This rapid bubble formation displaces the

liquid, forcing it upward and out of the bottle in a powerful geyser.

The Mythbusters team confirmed this using high-speed photography. They could see the bubbles forming immediately upon contact with the candy surface. They also tested smooth Mentos candies, which they had artificially polished, and found that the reaction was significantly less dramatic. This proved that the texture of the candy surface was crucial.

The Role of Ingredients in

Both Products

The team also examined whether the specific ingredients in Diet Coke and Mentos mattered. They tested regular Coke versus Diet Coke and found that the reaction was actually more vigorous with the diet version. Why? Because Diet Coke contains aspartame, which lowers the surface tension of the liquid. Lower surface tension means that bubbles can form more easily and grow larger. Regular Coke, which uses sugar or high-fructose corn syrup, has a higher surface tension, which slightly suppresses bubble formation. The Mythbusters confirmed this by testing other diet sodas and finding similar results.

As for the Mentos, they tested different

flavors and found that mint Mentos produced a stronger reaction than fruit-flavored ones. This is because mint Mentos have a rougher surface texture. The fruit-flavored ones are coated with a smooth, waxy layer that reduces the number of nucleation sites. Adam and Jamie poured the remaining liquid into a glass and considered the implications. While no toxic chemical reaction takes place, the rapid release of gas can cause severe stomach distress. More importantly, the force of the eruption can push foam into the Eustachian tubes or nasal passages, causing pain or injury. The team strongly

advised against attempting to consume the mixture immediately after the reaction. This myth was firmly busted from a safety standpoint.

Myth: The Geyser Can Lift a Person

In one of the episode's more theatrical demonstrations, the team tried to see if the force of a Diet Coke and Mentos geyser could lift a small object or even a person. They built a platform and positioned a bottle underneath it. While the geyser was impressive, it lacked the sustained force to lift anything of

significant weight. This myth was busted, though the spectacle was still entertaining.

RESULTS AND REVELATIONS
