
How To Get Your Voice Back

Apple Cider Vinegar (Diluted)

Raw apple cider vinegar can help balance pH levels and fight bacteria. Mix one tablespoon in a glass of warm water and drink it slowly once or twice daily. Do not use undiluted as it can burn your throat.

Slippery Elm or Marshmallow Root

These herbs contain mucilage, a gel-like substance that coats and soothes mucous membranes. They are available as lozenges or teas. Look for natural, sugar-free versions.

Throat Coat Tea

Commercially available herbal teas designed for sore throats (like Throat Coat by Traditional Medicinals) contain licorice root, slippery elm, and other soothing herbs. They are effective and convenient.

- **Cold beverages** – Ice-cold drinks can constrict blood vessels and slow healing; opt for room temperature or warm fluids.
