WHAT YOU WILL NEED FOR THIS DRAWING LESSON

You do not need a fancy art kit to follow along with this guide on **how to draw a horse for kids step by step**. In fact, you probably already have everything you need at home. Here is a simple list of supplies:

- **A pencil:** A regular number 2 pencil is perfect. It is easy to erase, which is important because we will be making light lines at first.
- **Paper:** Any white paper will work. Printer paper, construction paper, or a sketchbook are all fine choices.
- **An eraser:** A soft eraser is best so you don't tear the paper. Mistakes are just a part of learning, and erasing lets you try again.
- **A black marker or crayon (optional):** Once you are happy with your pencil drawing, you can trace over the final lines with a marker to make them stand out.
- **Crayons, colored pencils, or markers:** For coloring in your finished horse. Brown, black, white, and tan are common horse colors, but you can use any colors you like. A purple horse or a rainbow horse is always welcome in art.

Having these things ready before you begin will help you stay focused and have fun. Now, let us move on to the drawing itself.

STEP 1: START WITH SIMPLE SHAPES

The secret to drawing anything, especially animals, is to look for the basic shapes hiding inside the complex form. When we learn **how to draw a horse for kids step by step**, we start with circles and ovals. Do not worry about making them perfect. Just draw lightly so you can easily erase lines later.

1. **Draw a circle for the head:** Near the top-left side of your paper (if your horse will be facing left), draw a medium-sized circle. This will be the horse's head.
2. **Draw a larger oval for the body:** To the right of the head, draw a large, tilted oval. This oval should be about three times the size of the head circle. It represents the horse's chest and belly. Leave a small gap between the head and the body.
3. **Connect the head and body with two curved lines:** Draw one curved line from the top of the head to the top of the body oval. Draw another curved line from the bottom of the head to the bottom of the body oval. These lines form the horse's neck. Make the top line slightly curved like an arch, and the bottom line a bit straighter.

At this point, your drawing should look like a very simple, slightly lumpy animal. That is exactly right. We are building a foundation. Do not add details yet. Just focus on getting these big shapes in the right places.

STEP 2: ADD THE LEGS AND MUZZLE

Now that we have the main body shape, it is time to give our horse some legs. This is often the part that kids find tricky, but if we take it **step by step**, it becomes easy. Remember, horses have long, slender legs with big knees and hooves.

1. **Add the front legs:** From the front part of the body oval (the chest area), draw two lines going downward. Make them slightly wider at the top and narrower at the bottom. For the front left leg (the one closer to us), draw a straight line down. For the front right leg (the one further away), draw a line that is slightly behind the first one. At the bottom of each leg, draw a small angled line for the hoof.
2. **Add the back legs:** From the back part of the body oval (the rump), draw two more lines going downward. The back legs of a horse are different from the front legs. They have a big backward bend at the knee (like a dog's leg). Draw the left back leg with a bend in the middle. The right back leg (further away) should be drawn slightly behind. Add small hooves to the bottom of these legs too.
3. **Add the muzzle:** A horse has a long face. On the front of the head circle, draw a smaller rounded shape. This is the muzzle, which includes the nose and mouth area. It should stick out from the head circle like a little box.

Your horse now has a body, a head, a neck, and legs. It might look a little blocky, but that is okay. We are going to smooth everything out and add details next.

STEP 3: SHAPE THE HEAD AND ADD THE EARS

The face is where your horse will start to show its personality. In this part of our guide on **how to draw a horse for kids step by step**, we will refine the head and add some important features.

1. **Connect the head and muzzle:** Use curved lines to smoothly connect the top of the head circle to the top of the muzzle. Do the same for the bottom. This makes the horse's snout look more natural.
2. **Draw the ears:** On the top of the head, draw two small, pointed shapes. They should look like little triangles or leaves. Horse ears are very expressive and usually point forward or to the side. Make sure they are attached to the top of the head, not the side.
3. **Add the eye:** Draw a large, oval shape for the eye on the side of the head facing you. Inside the eye, draw a smaller circle for the pupil. Leave a tiny white dot in the pupil to create a sparkle or highlight. This little detail makes the horse look alive and friendly. Add a curved line above the eye for the eyebrow.

Now your horse has a face that is starting to look real. You can already see it coming to life.

STEP 4: DRAW THE MANE, TAIL, AND HOOVES

This is the fun part where we add the horse's most beautiful features: the mane and the tail. These flowing details give the horse movement and energy. Follow these steps carefully as we continue learning **how to draw a horse for kids step by step**.

1. **Draw the mane:** The mane is the hair that grows along the top of the horse's neck. Starting from between the ears, draw a series of curved, overlapping lines going down the back of the neck. You can make the mane short and neat, or long and wild—it is up to you. Use quick, jagged strokes to mimic the look of hair.
2. **Draw the tail:** The tail grows from the back of the horse's body, at the top of the rump. Draw a large, flowing shape that drops downward. You can make it straight or wavy. Use lots of small lines inside the tail shape to show the texture of the hair.
3. **Refine the hooves:** Look at the bottom of each leg. Make the hooves a bit wider than the leg itself. Add a small horizontal line across each hoof to show the division between the hoof and the leg. You can also round the bottom of the hooves slightly.

Your horse is almost complete. Take a moment to look at your drawing. You have turned a few simple shapes into a recognizable horse. That is a great achievement.

STEP 5: CLEAN UP YOUR DRAWING AND ADD DETAILS

Now that all the main parts are in place, it is time to make your horse look polished. This step is about refinement. It is a crucial part of the process when you are learning **how to draw a horse for kids step by step**.

1. **Erase the guidelines:** Remember the circles and ovals we started with? Now is the time to carefully erase them. Use your eraser to remove any overlapping lines that are not part of the final horse shape. Be gentle so you do not smudge the good lines.
2. **Darken the final lines:** Once the guidelines are erased, go over the main outlines of your horse with your pencil, pressing a little harder. You can also use a black marker for this step. Trace the head, the neck, the body, the legs, the ears, and the tail. This will make your horse pop off the page.
3. **Add small details:** Draw a small nostril on the muzzle (a tiny curved line). Add a smile line for the mouth. You can also draw a little more hair on the forelock—the hair that falls between the ears onto the forehead. If you want to get really detailed, you can add a few lines to show muscle definition on the legs and body.

Your horse is now fully drawn and ready for color. But before you reach for the crayons, let us look at a few tips to make your drawing even better.

PRO TIPS FOR DRAWING A BETTER HORSE

Even though this guide on **how to draw a horse for kids step by step** is designed to be easy, there are a few extra tricks that can help you create a more realistic or dynamic horse. Here are some pro tips you can try:

- **Watch the proportions:** A horse has a big body, a long neck, and a relatively small head. If your horse looks funny, check the size of your shapes. The body should be much larger than the head.
- **Use action lines:** If you want your horse to look like it is moving, draw the legs in a running pose. One pair of legs can be stretched forward, and the other pair stretched backward. This suggests motion, even on a flat piece of paper.
- **Practice makes progress:** Your first horse might not look exactly how you imagined. That is totally normal. The more you practice, the better you will get. Try drawing a horse from a photograph or even a toy horse to see how the parts fit together.
