CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT: WILL, HORACE, AND THE BOND BETWEEN THEM

Will Treaty: The Reluctant Hero

Will Treaty is not the typical fantasy hero. He is small, wiry, and younger than many of his peers. He does not possess superhuman strength or magical abilities.
