JONI MITCHELL'S UNIQUE TUNING TECHNIQUE

TIPS FOR MASTERING THE CHORDS ON GUITAR

Focus on the Rhythm

COMMON CHALLENGES AND HOW TO OVERCOME THEM

The Barre Chord Fatigue

The Bm chord in the pre-chorus can be frustrating. If you are new to barre chords, try playing the Bm as a partial barre (only pressing the top four strings) or using a capo

on a higher fret to transpose the song into a more comfortable key. However, the authentic **Help Me chords Joni Mitchell** sound relies on that full, rich barre, so it is worth the practice.

The Quick Key Change

The song modulates (changes key) briefly in the bridge. This sudden shift can disorient the ear.
