## Cause and Effect Clues

## Inference Clues

Their hands trembled, and their voices dropped to whispers.*" The description of trembling and whispering suggests fear or anxiety. Read each sentence. Circle the context clue or clues that help you understand the meaning of the bolded word. Then write which type of clue it is (definition, synonym, antonym, example, cause and effect, or inference).

1. The **predator**, a large hawk, swooped down to catch its prey. (Clue type: definition)  
*The phrase "a large hawk" defines predator.*
2. Unlike the **sparse** desert, the rainforest had dense, thick vegetation. (Clue type: antonym)  
*"Unlike" and "dense, thick vegetation" show that sparse means the opposite, or thinly scattered.*
3. We were **exhausted** after the hike; our legs ached, and we could barely stand. (Clue type: inference)  
*The details about aching legs and being unable to stand point to extreme tiredness.*
