Angle 1 and angle 3 are vertical angles, so angle 3 = 110° .

Angle 2 and angle 4 are corresponding angles? Wait—angle 2 is at the top-left intersection on the lower parallel line, angle 4 is at the top-left on the upper line? Actually, we need the diagram. Typically, angle 2 and angle 4 are alternate interior, so they are equal. Thus angle 4 = 70° .

This simple step shows how the worksheet builds systematic thinking.
