One of the most technically challenging missions of the war was the destruction of the Norsk Hydro heavy water plant in Vemork, Norway. Heavy water was a critical component for developing an atomic bomb. After an initial glider-borne commando raid ended in disaster, the SOE dropped a six-man team of Norwegian commandos. They skied across the mountains, scaled a ravine, infiltrated the plant, and placed explosives on the heavy water cylinders. The explosion destroyed the plant's production capacity, throwing a major stumbling block in front of the German nuclear program. The mission is considered a textbook example of sabotage by **Churchill's Secret Warriors**.

The Defeat of Rommel's Supply Lines

In North Africa, the combined efforts of the SAS, LRDG, and SOE systematically attacked Axis supply dumps, airfields, and ports.
