

How To Thaw Ground Beef

CAN YOU COOK GROUND BEEF FROM FROZEN?

How to Cook Frozen Ground Beef

Even if the meat still looks and smells fine, it may be unsafe to eat.

Avoid Hot Water

Using hot or warm water to speed up thawing is similarly risky. The heat encourages rapid bacterial growth on the surface while the interior remains frozen. This method also causes the meat to cook unevenly once you start preparing it.

Do Not Refreeze Without Cooking

If you have thawed ground beef using the cold water or microwave method, do not return it to the freezer unless you cook it first. The thawing process can activate bacterial growth, and refreezing without cooking traps those bacteria. However, refrigerator-thawed beef can be safely refrozen within one to two days if you have not cooked it.

Do Not Thaw in the Microwave Without Monitoring

Setting the microwave on defrost and walking away is a recipe for partially cooked, unevenly thawed meat. Always check the progress every 30 to 60 seconds and break apart any thawed sections.

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
