

How To Renew A Passport

ARE YOU ELIGIBLE TO RENEW YOUR PASSPORT?

If your passport was issued before you turned 16, it is significantly damaged (beyond normal wear and tear), lost or stolen, or issued more than 15 years ago, you cannot use the renewal process. In those cases, you must apply in person using Form DS-11. Understanding your eligibility is the first key step in learning how to renew a passport correctly. If you meet the above criteria, you can proceed with the simpler mail-in method.

GATHERING THE REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

Proper documentation is the backbone of a successful passport renewal. Missing or incorrect documents are the most common reasons for application delays. Here is a checklist of everything you need:

1. **Your most recent passport:** This must be submitted with your application. It will be returned to you separately after your new passport is issued.
2. **Form DS-82:** This is the U.S. passport renewal application form. You can fill it out online and print it, or complete it by hand using black ink. Do not sign it until instructed.
3. **One passport photo:** The photo must meet strict requirements: 2x2 inches, white background, taken within the last six months, with a neutral expression. No glasses unless you have a medical note. Many pharmacies and post offices offer passport photo services.
4. **Proof of name change (if applicable):** If your current legal name differs from the name on your previous passport, include a certified copy of your marriage certificate, divorce decree, or court order.
5. **Payment:** Fees vary depending on whether you choose standard or expedited service. Acceptable forms include personal check, money order, or credit card (only if using Form DS-82 online fillable version). Write the check payable to “U.S. Department of State.”

Double-check your documents before mailing. Make photocopies of everything for your records. Remember, the passport renewal process is straightforward when you follow these steps meticulously.

HOW TO FILL OUT FORM DS-82

Form DS-82 is the official renewal application. It is available on the U.S. Department of State’s website. You can complete it online and print it, which minimizes errors because the system checks for missing fields. If you prefer to print a blank form and fill it by hand, use black ink and print legibly. Key sections include:

- Your personal information: full name, date of birth, Social Security number, gender, and contact details.
- Travel plans: you are asked for an approximate departure date, but it is not mandatory.
- Previous passport details: you will need the passport book number and issue date, which are on your old passport.
- Emergency contact: provide a name and phone number for someone not traveling with you.
- Signature: do not sign the form until you are instructed to sign it in the presence of a notary or as per the instructions. For mail-in renewal, you sign it yourself, but the signature must be within the designated box and not touch the edges.

A common mistake is signing the form too early or using a blue pen. Stick to black ink. Also, ensure your Social Security number is correct, as it is used for verification. The form is not complicated, but attention to detail is crucial when learning how to renew a passport by mail.

PASSPORT PHOTO REQUIREMENTS AND TIPS

The passport photo is one of the most frequently rejected items. A poor-quality photo can delay your renewal by weeks. Follow these guidelines to get it right the first time:

- Size: exactly 2 inches by 2 inches. The head must be between 1 inch and 1 3/8 inches from chin to top of hair.
- Background: plain white or off-white, no patterns or shadows.
- Lighting: even lighting with no shadows on the face or background.
- Expression: neutral or natural smile, both eyes open, mouth closed.

- Clothing: no uniforms, camouflage, or clothing that blends with the background. Everyday attire is fine.
- Glasses: generally not allowed unless you have a signed medical note stating they are required for medical reasons. If possible, avoid glasses altogether.
- Head coverings: allowed only for religious or medical reasons, but the full face must be visible.

You can get passport photos at many drugstores, post offices, and photography studios. Some online tools allow you to take your own photo, but be extremely careful about proportions. Remember, the photo must be printed on glossy or matte photo paper; inkjet prints on regular paper are often rejected. A good photo speeds up the entire passport renewal process.

CALCULATING PASSPORT RENEWAL FEES

Passport renewal fees in the United States are set by the Department of State and are subject to change. As of 2025, the standard renewal fee for a passport book is \$130 for adults. If you also need a passport card (which is valid only for land and sea travel to Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Bermuda), the additional fee is \$30. The execution fee is waived for renewals by mail, so you only pay the application fee.

If you need your passport faster, you can request expedited service for an additional \$60. This typically reduces processing time from 8-11 weeks to 5-7 weeks, but during busy periods it can vary. You can also pay for 1-2 day delivery of the completed passport for an extra fee. Payment must be in the form of a personal check, money order, or credit card (if using the online form). Avoid cash. Write the check payable to “U.S. Department of State.” Double-check the total amount before mailing.

Knowing the correct fees is part of understanding how to renew a passport efficiently. Underpaying will cause delays; overpaying may result in a refund but slows processing. Always check the official [travel.state.gov](#) website for the most current fee schedule.

MAILING YOUR APPLICATION

Once your Form DS-82 is filled, your photo is taken, and your payment is ready, you need to mail everything together. Use a sturdy envelope, preferably a flat rate envelope from the post office, to prevent folding of documents. Include the following items in the envelope:

- Your completed and signed Form DS-82.
- Your most recent passport (old one).
- Your passport photo (loose, not stapled or glued).
- Proof of name change if applicable.
- Your payment (check or money order).

Address the envelope to the appropriate address based on your state of residence and whether you are requesting expedited service. For standard service, send it to the National Passport Processing Center in Philadelphia or another location as indicated on the form instructions. For expedited service, you must use a specific address. The most reliable method is to use the address listed on the official DS-82 form instructions page.

A critical step: Use a trackable mailing method like USPS Priority Mail or a courier service. Do not use standard first-class mail without tracking. Keep the tracking number and save it until you receive your new passport. Also, write “PASSPORT RENEWAL” on the envelope to ensure proper handling. Mailing correctly is a key part of knowing how to renew a passport without issues.

PROCESSING TIMES AND TRACKING

After you mail your application, patience is required. Standard processing currently takes 8 to 11 weeks, not including mailing time. Expedited processing takes 5 to 7 weeks. These timelines can fluctuate during peak seasons (spring and summer). You can check the status of your application online at the Department of State’s website using your last name and date of birth. You will need to wait about two weeks after mailing before the status updates.

Sign up for email updates if the system offers it. Your old passport will be returned separately, often a few weeks after your new passport arrives. If you need your passport urgently for travel within 2-3 weeks, you may need to schedule an appointment at a regional passport agency, but this requires proof of imminent international travel and an additional fee. Planning ahead is the best way to avoid emergencies when renewing a passport.

WHAT IF YOUR PASSPORT IS LOST OR STOLEN?

If your passport is lost or stolen, you cannot use the renewal process. You must apply in person using Form DS-11 and provide a detailed statement about the loss or theft, such as Form DS-64. This is a different procedure entirely. It is always wise to keep a photocopy or digital scan of your passport information page in a separate location for easy reference. If you are traveling and lose your passport, contact the nearest U.S. embassy or consulate. For domestic lost passports, report it immediately to prevent identity theft. Knowing the difference between renewal and replacement is crucial in passport management.
