This is directly inspired by the real "Highway of Tears" in British Columbia, Canada, where dozens of women, many Indigenous, have gone missing or been murdered since the 1970s. The episode also draws from the case of Robert Pickton, a Canadian serial killer who targeted vulnerable women.

The "Lucky" Episode and the BTK Killer

The episode "Lucky" features a serial killer who leads a double life as a respected member of his community while secretly murdering women. This mirrors the case of Dennis Rader, the BTK (Bind, Torture, Kill) killer, who was a church president and city employee in Wichita, Kansas, for decades while eluding capture. The show's portrayal of a seemingly ordinary man hiding a monstrous secret is a recurring theme in real profiling cases.

The "Profiling" of the Unabomber
