Zinc: Supporting Hormone Synthesis and Immune Regulation

Zinc is involved in the synthesis of thyroid hormones and helps regulate the immune system, which is particularly important because autoimmune conditions like Hashimoto's thyroiditis are common causes of thyroid dysfunction. Oysters, beef, crab, pumpkin seeds, and chickpeas are excellent sources of zinc.

Vitamin D and B Vitamins: The Supporting Cast

Vitamin D deficiency has been linked to both hypothyroidism and autoimmune thyroid disease. Spending time outdoors in sunlight, eating fatty fish, egg yolks, and fortified foods can help maintain adequate levels. B vitamins, especially B12 and folate, are also important because people with thyroid disorders often have lower levels of these vitamins. Leafy greens, legumes, whole grains, and animal proteins provide a solid foundation of B vitamins.

FOODS THAT SUPPORT THYROID HEALTH

Soy in Excess

Soy contains isoflavones that can inhibit thyroid hormone synthesis in some individuals, particularly when iodine intake is low. Moderate consumption of fermented soy products like tempeh and miso is generally fine, but avoid excessive amounts of soy protein isolates and supplements.

LIFESTYLE HABITS THAT PROTECT YOUR THYROID

Manage Chronic Stress
