The Phi Gamma Delta Creed reminds brothers that their fraternity experience should equip them with the emotional intelligence, resilience, and ethical grounding needed to excel in all these areas.

THE CORE VIRTUES EMBEDDED IN THE CREED

- **Scholarship:** While not explicitly mentioned, the context of college life and preparation for duties makes academic excellence a clear expectation.

COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT THE CREED

Misconception 3: The creed is exclusive.

Some view the phrase “manhood” as exclusionary. However, within the context of a men’s fraternity, it is a term of art that refers to character, not gender superiority. The values it promotes are universal.
